Apply Your Capital Credit Check to Your Monthly Bill

As a member of Tri-County Electric, you earn capital credits! When you signed up to receive electric service from Tri-County Electric Cooperative, you became a member of an electric utility. While investor-owned utilities return a portion of any profits back to their shareholders, electric cooperatives operate on an atcost basis. So instead of returning leftover funds, known as margins, to folks who might not live in the same region or even the same state as you do, Tri-County Electric Cooperative allocates and retires capital credits (also called patronage dividends, patronage refunds, patronage capital, or equity capital) based on how much electricity you purchased during a year.

As circumstances allow, Tri-County Electric writes a check to members who were on our lines for the specific year we are retiring. During 2024, members who received service in 2000 and 2001 received checks.

We now offer our members an option of applying their capital credit check directly to their bill. This allows members the convenience of receiving their capital credits without having to worry about going to the bank to cash a check or even the possibility of losing the check in the mail.

Are you interested in installing solar? Requesting three bids from qualified contractors before hiring for any project can potentially save you a lot of money and hardship down the road. You may be surprised at how different the prices for each contractor can be! We know that the cheapest option isn't necessarily the best option - "You get what you pay for".

However, we have seen instances where members were taken advantage of. We want you to be informed before making a large investment. It takes a little more homework to get three bids, but it's time well spent.

In addition to getting bids, make sure you review any contracts and service agreements thoroughly. Solar units are a major purchase, so discretion and careful review is necessary. Once you have done your due diligence, you can rest easy in your choice, knowing that you made an informed decision.



Bacon Cheeseburger Crockpot Tater Tot Casserole

Ingredients

2 lb. lean ground beef

10 strips bacon, diced

1 small onion, diced

4 cloves garlic, minced

1/3 c. all purpose flour

3 cups milk

1 Tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce

Dash of hot sauce, optional

3 cups cheddar cheese, plus extra for topping

12-16 oz. bag frozen mixed vegetables

1/4 cup sour cream

salt and pepper to taste

32 oz. bag frozen tater tots

Directions

- 1. In a large skillet brown ground beef, bacon, onion and garlic over medium heat until beef is thoroughly cooked.
- 2. Sprinkle flour over the beef mixture and stire well. Stir in the milk, Worcestershire sauce and hot sauce.
 - 3. Cook for 3 minutes or until thickened.
- 4. Remove from heat and stir in the cheddar, frozen vegetables and sour cream
- 5. Spray the crockpot with non-stick spray. Place some tater tots in the bottom of the crock pot.
 - 6. Pour beef mixture over tater tots.
- 7. Cover and cook on low for 3 hours. In the last 10 minutes of cooking, sprinkle with extra cheddar if desired.

- Keep equipment and yourself at least 10 feet from power lines.
- Work only when weather permits. Rain is a good conductor of electricity, and wind could blow a ladder out of control and into a power line.
- Never trim near power lines. Call professional tree trimmers to do the job.
- Never use water or blower extensions to clean gutters near electric lines. Contact a professional maintenance contractor.
- Follow safety guidelines whether you use an aluminum, wooden, or fiberglass ladder. Although some materials are better conductors than others, all ladders require the same precautions.
