



Important Upgrades to Tri-County Electric Cooperative's Infrastructure: What You Should Know

Tri-County Electric Cooperative is undertaking critical improvements to its power grid, which will enhance the reliability and efficiency of the electrical service provided to members. While these updates may not be immediately visible, they are essential for maintaining and strengthening the cooperative's infrastructure. Below is an overview of two significant projects in 2025.

Patoka-Kinmundy Transmission Line Upgrade

This project represents the second phase of a two-part effort to upgrade a 14-mile section of transmission lines. These upgrades will involve the installation of a "three-phase underbuild" system. While this may sound technical, it essentially means that the power lines will be modernized to carry more electricity and operate more efficiently, ensuring better performance and reliability.

The three-phase system is designed to provide a more stable flow of electricity. By upgrading these lines, the cooperative can reduce the likelihood of power disruptions and ensure that if one line experiences an issue, the remaining lines can maintain service. This ultimately results in fewer and shorter outages, providing a more dependable power supply for members.

Reserve Northeast Line Upgrade

The Reserve Northeast Line upgrade (Phase 1 of 2) was completed earlier this year, and involved replacing 2 miles of outdated three-phase conductor. Phase 2 of 2 will involve replacing an additional 2 miles of three-phase conductor. These older lines had reached the end of their

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useful life and needed to be replaced with newer, more robust technology.

By making these updates, Tri-County Electric will not only improve the reliability of





Even though we serve fewer consumers per mile of line, we will always go the extra mile for our members.




Southern Corn Fritters

Ingredients

- 1 can of corn (drained)
- 1/2 c. self-rising cornmeal
- 1/3 cup of flour
- 1 egg
- 1/4 c. of milk
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- · Oil for frying

Directions

- 1. In a bowl, mix the cornmeal, flour, salt, and pepper.
- 2. Beat in the egg and milk to form a batter.
- 3. Stir in the corn.
- 4. Heat oil in a frying pan over medium heat.
- 5. Drop spoonfuls of the batter into the hot oil and fry until golden brown, about 3 minutes per side.
- 6. Serve with ranch dressing or hot sauce for dipping.
