Voting is the one of the most powerful ways to make your voice heard in our democracy, but according to census.gov, only 67% of the voting age population in the United States reported voting in 2020. Modern technology has improved access to information on candidates and made it easier to register to vote in many areas, and it is vital to be aware of how you can participate!

Crockpot Hamburger Potato Casserole

Ingredients

- 5 small potatoes
- 2 lbs. ground beef, browned
- 2 cans cream of mushrooms soup
- 1 cup milk
- salt and pepper to taste
 - 1 1/2 cups shredded cheese

Directions

1. Brown your ground beef and set aside.

- 2. Peel and slice potatoes and set aside.
- 3. In a mixing bowl, combine cream of mush-room soup, milk, salt and pepper to taste. Mix well and set aside.
 - 4. Spray crockpot with non-stick spray.
- 5. Layer in the pan, potatoes, beef, soup, and cheese. Repeat the layers until all the beef and potatoes are used up. Top with remaining cheese and place lid on top.
- 6. Cook on high for 3-4 hours or until the potatoes are soft.
- 8. Turn off the crock pot and allow it to cool slightly (about 10 minutes). This will allow the casserole to thicken. Cut and serve with your favorite vegetable.

Maple Roasted Carrots

Ingredients

- 1 1/2 lbs. carrots, sliced 1/4 in. thick
- 2 Tbsp. melted butter
- 2 Tbsp. pure maple syrup
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. ground pepper
- 2 tsp. snipped fresh chives or parsley (optional)

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 400°
- 2. Stir carrots, butter, maple syrup, salt and pepper together in a large bowl. Spread evenly on a large rimmed baking sheet
 and roast, stirring once, until tender, 20-25 minutes. Sprinkle with chives or parsley, if desired.

Shining a Light on Rolling Blackouts

If you watch the news enough, you'll know that rolling blackouts exist in California, but how likely is it that you would experience one in Illinois? It's not an iminent threat that your cooperative fears, however, it's a possibility that we do prepare for.

A rolling blackout is a temporary, purposely executed power outage to protect the grid. The outage is arranged so that only certain areas are out of power for a limited amount of time. If not instituted, the whole system could experience a lengthy outage. These blackouts are called "rolling" because the outage moves from one area to the next so that power isn't out for too long in any one location.

In the event of a rolling blackout scenario, we would hope for plenty of notice, but a lot of times that is not realistic. Therefore, your cooperative runs through scenarios to work in a moment's notice to mitigate the effects of outages and communicate outage schedules to you.

We don't wish to raise alarm about blackouts, we simply want you to know that we're always forward-thinking and continuously preparing to serve you under any circumstances.
